# High-flying Ella has an inspiring story



She's just one small step away from a place at Oxford University and is applying as a volunteer with the RNIB to develop her skills and independence.

All this after Ella lost her remaining sight overnight back in 2015 and surgery could not restore it.

The Support Services for Education Vision Support Team has been with her on her journey, having worked with her since before she started school.

After she lost her sight the team started to work even more intensively with Ella. They had already worked on teaching her low vision skills.

Now they taught her braille, working with her at home so the busy student didn't miss any lessons.

A year after losing her sight she achieved 10 A\* and two As at GCSE. She decided to stay at her school Kings of Wessex rather than going for a specialist placement for students with visual impairment.

Having achieved an A\*, A and B at A-level she's planning to re-take and swap her B for an A to take up a deferred offer at Oxford. Oxford is offering her maths tuition to achieve this.

The Vision Support team is still offering support in a holistic way and Ella became a fully qualified guide dog owner in the summer.
